Churchyard	This proposed local green space consists of a group of sites that make up the central paddocks between Grange Lane, St Mary's Place and Brook Street / The Street in the village centre.	The site surrounds the Grade I listed church of St Mary the Virgin and is generally well looked after by those responsible and by villagers, e.g., the Churchyard. There are community clear ups. It is used for horse grazing, and for parties by the owners from time to time. The site is considered to be integral to the feel and identity of little Dunmow. Around these central paddocks are several of the listed buildings in the village which frame the Grade I listed church and contribute to its historic setting.. The fields are separated by substantial hedgerows with different species of plants and trees as well as birds and wildlife. This area has been mentioned in the Conservation area document for Little Dunmow as being a defining feature as well as containing parts of the significant archaeological site in the village. 2	Church Surrounds: a. Greensward in between the Church and the Road b. Land to front of Priory Place c. Land opposite front door to Church d. Church Yard	Provides surrounds to Grade I listed church in centre of village.	These areas frame the Grade I listed church and Grade II listed Priory Place. The site also contains footpath 24 which provides recreational value and the row of magnificent lime trees within the churchyard. The area containing the distinctive lime trees is mentioned in the Conservation area document for Little Dunmow as being a defining feature.	Key relationship to designated heritage assets, contributing to the character of the centre of the village. These areas are well looked after by their owners/ users. 4	Land in front of the Moors, the Village Signpost	Provides entrance to village centre on approach from B1256. .	Visually important site as it frames the entrance to the village, and it has the Village Signpost which was erected on the 800 year anniversary of the Magna Carta. Little Dunmow is associated with one of the baron signatories. The site therefore has historic significance as well as making a contribution to local identity. 5	Village recreation ground and entrance from St Mary's Place	Off St Mary's Place & adjacent to Brook Street. Connects the Flich Way to the centre of the village.	Very important community space that provides recreational opportunities for local children and other residents. Contains a children's playground. Site of village portacabin which provides PC meeting space. The site hosts village events to mark important days in public life, e.g., the coronation. 6	The village pond	Within centre of village on The Street.	The village pond is within the conservation area. Although it is privately owned, the PC has undertaken recent maintenance / landscaping work. A recent survey has not been done for wildlife however birds use the pond. 7	Station Road hedgerows	Separating village centre from key route of Station Road.	These are substantial and contain trees as well. 8	Green areas to middle of Brook Street	Serving properties along Brook Street. It serves to separate the conservation area from the new development the Moors. There are two grade II listed houses opposite and Ivy Cottage to one side. It helps to maintain the feel of the green spaces in Little Dunmow which is a key feature of the village and there are edge roads on two sides which is another feature of Little Dunmow.
